



Ending homelessness
in Brisbane one person,
one family at a time

Campaign Outcomes
2014 – 2017

500 Lives 500 Homes is a community-wide collaborative effort to break the cycle of homelessness for families, young people and adults in Brisbane. The campaign began with a community-wide Registry Fortnight in March-April 2014, where we undertook to know each person who was homeless by name and survey their individual health, housing and support needs.

Findings and Outcomes for **Families with a Parent aged ≥25**

We surveyed

parents aged 25 or over from **608** families
with **1,253** accompanying children under 18

Parents surveyed

- 608** parents surveyed
- 78%** identified as female
- 76%** were sole parents
- 25%** identified as Indigenous

Children counted

- 1,253** accompanying children counted
- 287** additional children not accompanying parents
- 2.5** children (on average) under 18 in each family
- 40%** of accompanying children were aged 6 to 12 years



Average age of parents was **36 years**. Average age of children was **8 years**.
Average time families were homeless was **1.5 years**.

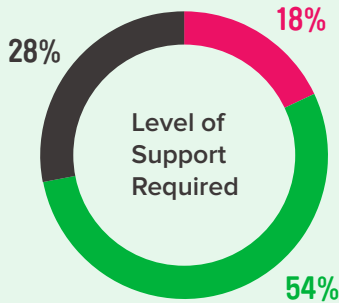
The following data was collected during the 500 Lives 500 Homes campaign conducted from March 2014 – March 2017.

The data was based on 608 families with a head of household aged 25 years or over, surveyed using the Vulnerability Index Service Prioritisation Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT).

Many survey respondents identified one or more family members impacted by poor physical and/or psychosocial health. The families are identified below.

Prioritising and Matching

The VI-SPDAT enables needs to be determined using an acuity scale, which in turn enables us to appropriately triage for services that match those needs.

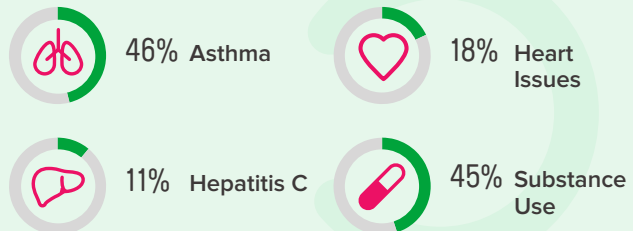


- Housing and long-term support (High Acuity)

- Affordable Housing (Low Acuity)

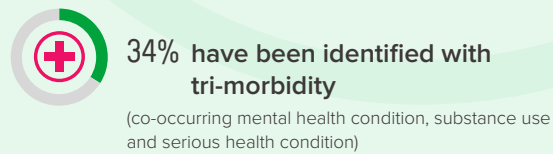
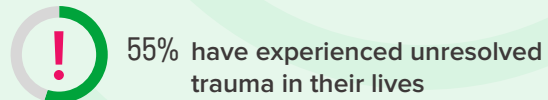
Health Needs Snapshot

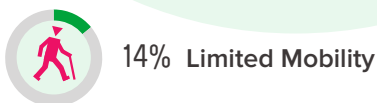

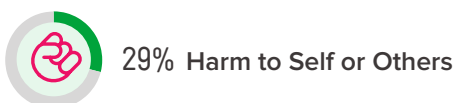

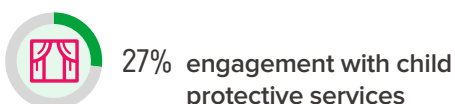

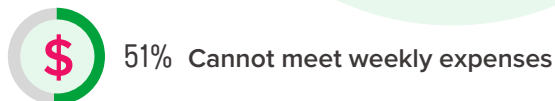

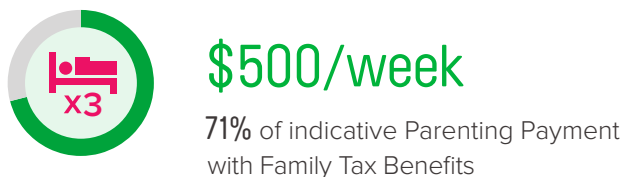

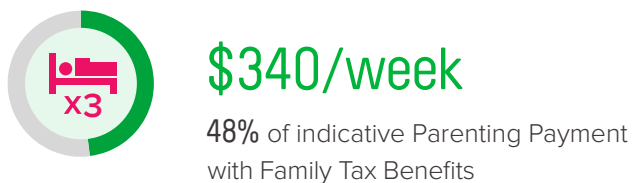

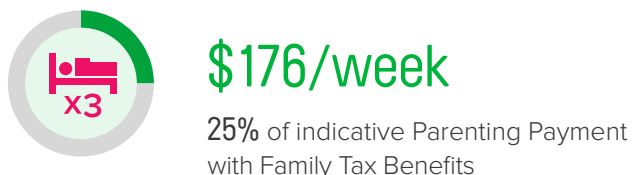
Three-bedroom unit in Brisbane

Homelessness is solvable

We must connect people experiencing homelessness with long-term housing as quickly as possible and with no preconditions. Known as **Housing First**, this approach has propelled campaign successes and forms the basis of a community-driven action plan to eliminate homelessness in the city of Brisbane. Ending Homelessness...

involves...

1. Preventing first time or episodic homelessness
2. Responding to crises as they occur in the shortest possible time
3. Sustaining tenancies

by using 5 strategies...

1. Know who's there and what they need
2. Implement coordinated entry system
3. Line up supply
4. Keep people housed
5. Integrate health

across the full life course.
